
Letter from Edie

As I reflect on 2024, I am deeply proud of all that the Kelly Brush Foundation has accomplished. We hosted more camps, gave out more adaptive equipment grants, worked with nine of the best SCI rehabilitation hospitals to get our digital platform into the hands of the newly injured, and helped improve access to outdoor recreation across the state of Vermont. These are just a few of our accomplishments this year - look through the rest of this Impact Report for more!

This year, we conducted a longitudinal study on our longest-running and most well-funded program, the Active Fund, through which the KBF gives out grants for cost-prohibitive adaptive sports equipment. We surveyed grantees 1 year after they received their equipment to determine the impact their grant has on their lives. The results are inspiring: 100% of respondents confirmed that the Active Fund meets KBF's mission to inspire and empower people with spinal cord injuries to live active and engaged lives. In addition to that, 97% have seen their quality of life improve since receiving their equipment. These results reinforce the profound difference we're making through this program.





Reaching, Supporting, and Connecting The Newly Injured

The KBF's community platform, the Active Project, provides everything that's needed to start, or further, an adaptive sports journey. Now people with disabilities have access to peers, events, adaptive sports programs, and instructional resources, all in one place. This year, we enhanced the platform with an events calendar, user messaging, and a biweekly virtual discussion group with new experts every week. These new features have


helped usage skyrocket, connecting more people to opportunities to try sports, meet others, and get active.

In 2024, we also began partnering with rehab hospitals across the country so that therapists could introduce their newly injured patients to what's possible in the exhilarating, confidence-boosting, and joyful world of adaptive sports. One therapist described it as "the most game-changing resource I've seen in years." We plan to work with even more hospitals in 2025 and beyond.

Rollettes Experience

This year was KBF's first time sponsoring and attending the Rollettes Experience in Los Angeles, CA! Girls and women with SCI and other disabilities gathered for a weekend of dance, art, entertainment, community building, and informational seminars.

Triumph Foundation's **Sports Festival**

The KBF sponsored and attended the Triumph Foundation's Wheelchair Sports Festival in Santa Clarita, CA. The festival is a massive 200+ people open house with tons of different sports to tru, such as hockey, basketball, quad rugby, racquetball, handcycling, baseball, yoga, and more!

Utah Monoski Day

The KBF hosted a day for alpine skiers from all over to gather in Park City, Utah to ski the powder together. With representatives from all of the adaptive programs in the Salt Lake City area, athletes got to connect during chairlift rides through the Rockies.

Shirley Ryan MTB Camp

Shirley Ryan AbilityLab came East from Chicago with their mountain bike program regulars to explore our simultaneously rugged and accessible Vermont terrain. The group of adaptive mountain bikers got to try uphill climbs to flowing downhills and plenty of laps at the Killington Bike Park.

Shepherd Summer Camp at STARS

KBF supported 6 participants to attend Shepherd Center's summer trip to Steamboat STARS, a fully accessible ranch. The group explored handcycling, water skiing, gondola ride, and horseback riding among the mountains and Yampa River.



Active Fund: Granting Independence

The Active Fund is the KBF's flagship program. Twice a year, we give out grants for cost-prohibitive adaptive sports equipment so people can be active independently. The longitudinal impact study shows that one year after receiving their grant:

100% agree: The Active Fund inspires and empowers individuals with spinal cord injuries to live active, engaged lives.

Over 95% of recipients noted an enhanced quality of life and newfound freedom, while more than 90% felt better connected to their communities and experienced improved physical health.

The study showed that owning equipment enables recipients to recreate on their own terms, build stronger social connections, and find new opportunities in adaptive sports, with many respondents describing their grants as "freedom," "independence," and "adventure."

In 2024, we provided nearly \$100,000 in matched funds to help 27 ski clubs across the country keep over 10,000 racers safer on race and training courses. We continue to supply Stop the Bleed kits to coaches and volunteers to always have them available during racing and training. We moved the conversation forward with our advocacy for safety in ski racing, starting at the top levels of the sport and reaching every club across the country.

Access for All: 100+ Miles of Universal Trails The KBF made significant strides in making outdoor recreation more accessible by helping to adapt over 100 miles of trails in Vermont for adaptive mountain bikes. A highlight of this effort has been The Driving Range — Vermont's first purpose-built universal trail network, managed by Richmond Mountain Trails

in Bolton, VT. This extensive trail system serves as a model for what inclusive outdoor recreation can look like, providing individuals with spinal cord injuries and other mobility challenges the opportunity to experience Vermont's beautiful mountain landscapes in a whole new way.

A Night to Inspire


